

# Cure of the Leper

The fate of lepers in biblical times was harsh. They were treated as religious and social outcasts. Because of the contagious nature of leprosy, they were banished from the community. Considered ritually unclean, they were excluded from the religious life of the people. Illness was seen as a consequence of sin. Lepers were regarded as sinners. It was assumed that God too had rejected them. Rejection hurts beyond any other state or emotion. Acceptance is the answer to rejection.

Jesus didn't regard the leper as unclean. He saw him simply as a human being in need. He allowed him to come to him – he talked to him, then to the amazement of all he reached out and touched him. And all at once the leprosy left him. By touching the leper, Jesus was breaking the law, and in doing so, became ritually unclean himself. Why did he do this?

Because that's the kind of person he was. In this small gesture we see Jesus' compassion for the outcasts. Jesus never cured just an illness, he cured the person. Healing the body is good but not enough if the spirit is bruised and broken. He saw that the person needed healing in body and in spirit. With a body horribly wounded by leprosy and his spirit deeply wounded by rejection. Touching the leper Jesus healed his wounded spirit, and restored his lost dignity as a human being and a child of God.

Jesus touched the leper to show us that external uncleanness does not defile the clean of heart. He touched the leper to teach us to despise no one, or to regard them as pitiable, because of some bodily affliction.

This story was written by Mark, forty years after the death and resurrection of Jesus. You might ask what was it meant to convey to the Christians of that time, and what is it meant to convey to us now? Four things! All of them had experienced the healing power of Jesus. How? Leprosy symbolises sin. They had been cleansed of sin through the waters of baptism. The same applies to us now.

Just as the leper went away and told everyone, everywhere, what Jesus had done for him, so Christians ought to spread the 'good news' of salvation.

Just as Jesus broke through the religious and social taboos, and reached out to the leper, so the Christian community should reach out to people society rejects.

There is a lesson for us in the way Jesus treated the leper. We marvel at the kindness and respect he showed him. For someone in the leper's condition to be touched with respect would in itself have been a tremendously healing thing.

We can learn from this in our dealings with the sick and the wounded. We are humbled by the generosity of Jesus, because he shows up the poverty of our hearts. Yet in a strange sort of way we are also elevated, because he stretches our capacity for compassion and challenges us to reach out and touch, to reach out to the wounded and the excluded within our very parish, our very homes, our schools, our workplace, our community.

May we all experience the healing touch of Jesus who loves us, and may we share Jesus' healing touch with all those we serve and care for.
