"From the fullness of the Heart the mouth speaks"

Whenever we go for a medical check-up, one of the things the Doctor will do is to examine the tongue. "Say 'ah'!" Looking at the tongue can tell the Doctor a great deal. The tongue, that is, our speech as a theme of this weekend's readings.

One of the most versatile parts of the human body is the tongue. It has many muscles, nerve endings and taste buds. We use it for taste and eating. It warns us if something is too hot or spoiled. We need it to manipulate food and of course we use it for speaking. It is one of the busiest parts of the body and one of the most powerful.

This week-ends readings from Sirach and the Gospel of Luke speak about the power of the tongue, the power of speech. They are about the tongue as a sword and a symptom.

Think back over time and ask how many people have we touched with our words? With our words we can give comfort, strength, encouragement, praise. We can sing to the glory of God or we can hurt people destroy reputations, spread suspicion and slander. Our words can clarify and clear the air. They can deceive and create confusion. Words can cause a war or begin the process of peace.

What we say is more powerful and long lasting than anything we do with our fist. If we verbally abuse someone our words cut into places deeper than the body. They cut into the heart and soul of a person and those wounds from another's words don't heal easily – "sticks and stones may break my bones but names will never hurt me" is a lie. We all know the terrible terror of the untamed tongue!

Today's reading from Sirach and the Lord's closing words in the Gospel, "From the fullness of the heart, the mouth speaks" teach that how we speak to and of others is a symptom, a pretty good indicator of what is happening in our heart.

As we approach Lent, our readings call us to look not only at our speech but also at our heart. Most of the year, we reflect about the state of the world, the culture, the media, the scandals out there. Lent is a time to look within - at the state of our heart! Are we trying to clear the speck from another's eye and missing the log within our own? We know what our heart is like through the things that come out of it. And one of them is the power of speech, our words. Let us not forget the power of the good word, the healing word, the helping word, when we let our words be the word of the Lord to others. A good word, a Christian word to another has an effect that will last a lifetime.

Yes! That odd, strange, versatile organ, the tongue, is more powerful than any muscle in our body. Through it, we touch the lives of hundreds, even thousands for better or worse.

"From the fullness of the heart, the mouth speaks.". If we give our heart to Christ and then speak from that heart, we will say the right thing. It may not be popular, it may not be elegant, it may not be the most politically correct, but it will be the right thing. Our words will carry the word of the Lord. If our heart reflects Christ, so will our words.

Let us take an opportunity to join in Lenten discussion groups. Please inquire through the parish office what groups are in place that you may join. Let the words of healing forgiveness and love be born anew in our hearts and proclaimed strongly in our speech. Compassion sounds like a pretty good place to start!

STATEMENT FROM ARCHBISHOP MARK COLERIDGE, PRESIDENT OF THE AUSTRALIAN CATHOLIC BISHOPS CONFERENCE

The news of Cardinal George Pell's conviction on historical child sexual abuse charges has shocked many across Australia and around the world, including the Catholic Bishops of Australia.

The Bishops agree that everyone should be equal under the law, and we respect the Australian legal system. The same legal system that delivered the verdict will consider the appeal that the Cardinal's legal team has lodged. Our hope, at all times, is that through this process, justice will be served.

In the meantime, we pray for all those who have been abused and their loved ones, and we commit ourselves anew to doing everything possible to ensure that the Church is a safe place for all, especially the young and the vulnerable.
